Pastor's Page A Winter's Tale

Who likes snow? I must confess that as I get older I find I can live without it just fine. Well, it is quite pretty to look at for about five minutes or so and then the cold and the wet and the inconvenience creep in and it all ends up just being deeply unpleasant and downright dangerous. The weather forecasters are threatening us with a lot of snow this winter, as the mild winters of recent years give way to the big freeze. While this may be good news for the children (and adults who are still big kids at heart), it is not good news for anyone who has to go out anywhere or do anything!

The Winter's Tale by William Shakespeare has the line, 'a sad tale's best for winter' and, despite the warm joys and blessings of Christmas, winter can be a difficult time for many people especially the elderly, the lonely, the poor and the homeless. The wintery carol Good King Wenceslas, sung on Saint Stephen's Day or Boxing Day, has no mention of the birth of Jesus but a lot about snow. It concerns a 10th century Bohemian Duke, also known as Vaclav the Good. He was renowned for his good works among the poor, even providing pine logs for a poor man who lived in a forest?

Good King Wenceslas looked out on the feast of Stephen, When the snow lay round about deep and crisp and even; Brightly shone the moon that night though the frost was cruel, When a poor man came in sight, gathering winter fuel.

Less well known is that he laboured tirelessly to spread the gospel and Christianise his dukedom. This incurred the wrath of his wicked brother, Boleslaw the Bad, who assassinated him. Despite this sad tale, his story lives on and continues to inspire people to spread the Good News of Jesus that, as the angels proclaimed, is good news of great joy for all people (Luke 2210), and seek to alleviate poverty in the world. Wenceslas's remains are interred in St Vitus's cathedral in Prague, and he was recently made patron saint of the Czech Republic. The last verse challenges us all to live more like him and look to the needs of others.

Therefore, Christian men, be sure wealth or rank possessing, Ye who now will bless the poor shall yourselves find blessing.



The antiphon anticipating the advent of Christ consisted of a long, drawn-out "Oh!" called "The Great O of Advent," intended to express a deep sense of longing for the coming of the Saviour. As time went by, other phrases were added and in 1851 it was translated into English and became the carol, "O Come, O Come, O Come Emmanuel"; 4. 80 miles; 5. One; (Matthew 2:9); 6. Silent Night; 7. At His crucifizion (Mark 15:23) and burial (John 19:38-40); 8. There is no mention of any animals in the New Testament, but Isaiah 1:3 says "The ox knows his master, the donkey his owner's manger" which could mean they would be present at the birth; 8. contribution will mean so much to the children who receive the gifts. In all, the GU/KT area was able to process and send 16,247 shoeboxes this year. This is quite a large drop from last year's figures and caused by a number of different factors, but mostly because of the increase in the suggested donation and the fact that many other organisations now run similar schemes. But it makes the shoeboxes that we were able to send even more valuable!
